### EXTRACTS

#### FROM THE MINUTES OF THE YEARLY MEETING OF FRIENDS FOR NEW-ENGLAND,

HELD ON RHODE-ISLAND,

From the 11th to the 16th, inclusive, of the Sixth Month, 1837.

THE annual Report of the Boarding School Committee was received and read, and the attention given by the Committee to the concerns of the Institution placed under their care, was satisfactory to this Meeting. The following is the Report:—

#### TO THE YEARLY MEETING.

The Boarding School Committee Report, that they have endeavoured to discharge the duties confided to them by the Yearly Meeting, during the past year, in giving their attention to the various concerns of the Institution.

Meetings have been regularly continued, and harmony has prevailed. The average number of scholars has been one hundred and thirty-four. At the present time there are twelve scholars in the Institution who are not members of our religious Society, all but two of whom are connected with Friends. Our friends Enoch and Lydia Breed have continued, acceptably, to act as Superintendents, during the past year, but desiring to be released, we have at this time agreed with our friends Rowland and Alice Rathbun, to serve the Institution in that capacity, who are expected to enter upon this service the first of next month. Moses B. Lockwood, Jonathan L. Slocum, Samuel Austin and Lewis Taber are employed as Teachers in the Boys' School, and Mary-Ann Barker, Emeline Aldrich, and Elizabeth H. Osborne, in the Girls'. George F. Reed is employed as instructor in the Languages. Isaac Hathaway continues to exercise a care over the Boys out of school hours, and to act as book-keeper, and Free-love Greene is employed as a care-taker of the Girls, and has charge of the sewing School.

The Treasurer's and Superintendent's accounts have been settled, by which it appears that the Institution is in debt, \$5,158 65 cts. This debt may be ascribed, principally, to the high price, for the past two years, of the various articles of consumption required in the family, and to there not having been so large a number, as heretofore, admitted into the School, who were not members of our Society, the terms of whose admission are higher than for members. In order to meet the present deficiency, we have requested the Treasurer of the School Fund to effect a loan of five thousand dollars. It appearing to the Committee, that some means must be adopted to liquidate this debt, and to meet the probable current expenses of the School for the future, we propose for the consideration of the Yearly Meeting, that Books and Stationary be charged to the scholars, at their cost at wholesale; that the privilege granted Monthly Meetings be suspended; that the allowance for travelling expenses to children who come from the three eastern Quarterly Meetings, be reduced from six to four cents per mile; and that the general price of board and tuition, (for members of this Yearly Meeting,) be raised to seventeen dollars per quarter, payable as heretofore, in advance—to commence on the first of eighth month next. By adopting this arrangement, with the probable reduction of cost in the articles of consumption, it is believed that the expenses of the School may be met, and the debt gradually discharged.

The amount of funds belonging to the Institution, for the schooling of poor children, including the bequest for that purpose by our late friend Moses Brown, is \$6650. It is proposed that this should be kept, by the Treasurer, distinct from the general funds; and the income of it will support twelve children, six months each, at seventeen dollars per quarter.

We have continued to appoint committees to examine the School semi-annually, who, on these occasions, have devoted several days to the service. By their reports we are informed, that the general appearance of the School has been such as to give them much satisfaction. The scholars have given encouraging evidence of attention to their various studies, in most of which they have exhibited a proficiency alike creditable to them and to their teachers. There has been an agreeable manifestation of a conformity, on the part of the children, to the advice of Friends in respect to plainness.

In adverting to the past year we feel bound to acknowledge the preservation that has been mercifully extended to us, under which we trust, the School has been continued in good degree, in accordance with the intentions of the Yearly Meeting in its establishment.

THE several propositions, contained in the preceding Report of the Boarding School Committee, having been referred for consideration, to a Committee of this Meeting, they produced, at a subsequent sitting, the following Report, which was united with, and was directed to be forwarded to our several Quarterly and Monthly Meetings, in connection with the Report of the School Committee, viz.



"To the Yearly Meeting.—The Committee to take into consideration the propositions contained in the Report of the Boarding School Committee, report, that they have given them their careful consideration, and that they are united in opinion, that it will be best for the Yearly Meeting to adopt them, for the present year. We would propose however, (in accordance with the intention of the School Committee,) that the class Books, for reading, should be supplied to the scholars, free of expense, and that this information be appended to the Report of the School Committee.

"We would propose, in order for a proper selection of poor children to occupy the privilege of the charitable Fund,\* that Monthly Meetings be requested to ascertain the number of children of this description, in their respective Meetings, and to communicate their names and ages to the acting Committee of the school, by the time of their meeting in the 9th month next, at Providence.

\*The words of Moses Brown's Will, in relation to his bequest, are,—“for the schooling of such members of the Society as are actually poor, supported or not as such, by the respective Monthly Meetings; and females are to have equal advantages of the whole of this legacy as males.”]

This Meeting having again taken under deliberate consideration, the propriety of admitting Children into its Boarding School, who are not members of our Society, came to the conclusion, that it would not be advisable to receive any children who are not members, except in those cases where one or both Parents are members, and who, in the judgment of the acting Committee, are proper subjects to become inmates of the Institution.

Answers to the Queries on the subject of Education, received from our several Quarterly Meetings, were read, and a Committee appointed to compile a digest of the information therein contained, and if way should open for it, to prepare a minute of advice on this subject. At a subsequent sitting, the Committee presented the following Report, viz.

"To the Yearly Meeting.—The Committee to whom was referred the subject of Education, report, that by the information received from the several Quarterly Meetings, there appear to have been, in the course of the past year, three Monthly Meeting schools, averaging six months; three Preparative Meeting schools, which averaged eight months; fifteen Family schools, averaging seven months, and one recently established. Also five private or select schools, under the entire control of Friends, but not confined exclusively to Friends' children. The number of scholars who have attended the above schools, [or who have received instruction at the Yearly Meeting's Boarding school,] is reported to have been about five hundred and fifty; making an increase, since last year, of one hundred and fifty. Several district schools have been taught by members of our Society.

"Although the information derived from the answers to the Queries, is not so full and explicit as would have been desirable, yet it affords evidence of the interest felt, by many Friends, in the welfare of the rising generation, by providing the means of acquiring a guarded education. While some parents, in many parts of our widely extended Yearly Meeting, are making commendable exertions to bring up their children in the way they should go, we regret that this concern is not more extensively felt. In looking over our Society, and beholding the children who are soon to take the places of the parents, and upon whom the important concerns of Society must ere long devolve, a deep solicitude is felt on this account, that the clay in the hands of the potter may not be marred on the wheel. We are aware that some of the peculiar testimonies which we are called upon to sustain, and which distinguish us from other religious denominations, are liable to be viewed by our children, who are compelled to associate with others in acquiring a practical education, as presenting a formidable obstacle in the way of their continuing consistent members of our Society;—and we earnestly recommend to parents, and particularly to those whose locations are so remote from each other, as to render it impracticable to establish schools of their own, to endeavor to remove this obstacle, as far as it may be done, by providing the means of instruction in their own families, and by impressing upon the minds of their offspring the importance of building up this hedge about them, which may prove the blessing of preservation in after years.

"In conclusion, we would simply advert to the necessity of still maintaining a lively interest in this highly important and interesting concern, not only as a duty incumbent upon us, but as a means of contributing to the happiness and welfare of the beloved youth.

Which having been read and considered, was satisfactory to us; and this Meeting having long been deeply interested for the guarded education of the children and youth of our Society, recommends this subject to the solid attention of Friends; and directs that copies of the Report be forwarded to our several Quarterly and Monthly Meetings.

Yearly Meeting of Friends for New-England,—Sixth month, 1837.

This Meeting having been brought under exercise for the preservation and right advancement of the Christian testimonies, which distinguish us, to a great extent at least, from the various other bodies of professing Christians,—a concern has prevailed, that in all our movements to promote the cause of truth and righteousness in the earth, whether it be the amelioration of the condition of our fellow beings who are suffering under oppression, or the moral and religious improvement of our brethren of the human family generally,—a recurrence may be had, by all our members, to the ground of religious concern, and to the guidance of that Wisdom which is first pure, then peaceable, gentle and easy to be entreated,—and which is profitable to direct us in the path of safety. And under this exercise, an earnest solicitude has been felt, that we may do nothing to compromise the testimony to the spiritual nature of Divine worship, borne by our early Friends, when called upon to leave the various religious denominations with which they had been associated, and again to revive among the nations in which they were scattered, a testimony to the operative influence of the Spirit of Truth upon the mind of man, so amply borne witness to in the Holy Scriptures, as essentially necessary to the performance of every religious act, and for our guidance in every good word and work. And while we desire that we may all maintain a spirit and temper which will prevent us from condemning, or in any way attempting to impede the well meant endeavors of others to promote any of the objects of Christian benevolence, or of moral reform, that occupy the attention of the public mind, in the present day; we have believed that the preservation of the precious testimonies to which we have alluded, and our influence, as a religious Society, in promoting the important objects, alike desirable to every benevolent mind, very much depend upon a close adherence to our peculiar principles.

Under these considerations, we have believed, that to open our meeting-houses to Lecturers, whose opinions and principles, on many subjects, that we consider of primary importance, are widely different from ours, and which we apprehend are frequently brought into view in such lectures, will have a tendency to draw off the minds of our members, from an establishment in the truth of those principles which have ever been maintained by us, and from a practical exemplification of them in our conduct. It is therefore our advice and judgment, that all such applications for the use of our meeting-houses, may be discontinued by Friends.

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### ADDRESS.

THE SUBJECT OF SLAVERY, as it now exists in some parts of our common country, having been brought impressively before us, at the present time, we have deemed it right to call the attention of our own, and of other Christian communities, to its serious consideration.

It is well known that the Society of Friends, as a religious body, have long maintained a decided testimony against holding their fellow men in bondage. A testimony which had its origin in a deep felt conviction that the practice could not be reconciled with the precepts and doctrines of the Christian religion. Yet in thus renewedly adverting to the subject, we feel no disposition to keep out of view, the fact, that in the earlier settlement of Friends in this country, many of them did, in common with other professors of the Christian name, participate in the practice; and we have thought that encouragement would be derived from a brief recurrence to the rise and progress of the concern for its removal, so far as relates to the Society of Friends.

Individuals of the Society, if not opposed to it from the commencement, very soon became uneasy with the system; they were drawn to a consideration of the subject on Christian principle, and becoming fully convinced that it was inconsistent with the spirit of the Gospel of love and peace, they felt themselves called upon, not only to bear an individual testimony against it, but from a sense of religious duty, to labour, in love, with their brethren, for its removal. They saw, that the descendants of Africa were fellow beings, equally with ourselves the objects of Divine regard, and that the sacred injunction of doing unto others, in all things, as we would that they



should do unto us, was as applicable to them as to any other portion of the human family. The patient and persevering efforts of these, and of other pious men, who succeeded them, and in whom the love of God was largely accompanied with its never-failing attendant, the love of man, were eminently blessed;—the concern gradually extended, till neighborhoods and meetings were brought to see the inconsistency and injustice of claiming property in their fellow men,\* and eventually the Society at large, having in their collective capacity, long been deeply exercised with a consideration of the subject, and having gradually advanced, step by step, towards so desirable a result, became united in restoring the enjoyment of the natural and inalienable rights of man, to all who had been held in a state of Slavery by members of the Society, throughout the several Yearly Meetings of Friends on this continent.—And for more than half a century, no person could hold his fellow being in bondage, and retain his connection with Friends.

Our predecessors in religious faith, having thus cleared themselves and the Society, from any participation in a practice which they believed to be inconsistent with the precepts and doctrines of our blessed Lord and his Apostles, the subject of Slavery has never ceased to occupy the feeling consideration of Friends, as a body of professing Christians, concerned for the promotion of truth and righteousness in the earth; and they have been led, from time to time, to cast whatever weight of influence they may have possessed, into the scale favorable to the cause of their enslaved fellow men, of African descent.

The testimony which was so dear to our worthy predecessors, and which they made many sacrifices to establish, (while Slavery was yet tolerated in *most*, if not *all* the States in which they resided,) is still cherished by us, and we have earnestly desired, may ever be inviolably maintained by all our members. We believe it to rest on the immutable basis of truth and justice, and of pure Christianity. We still continue deeply to sympathize with all who are under oppression. Yet we would remind all our dear Friends of every class and station in the Society, that as the concern had its origin in a faithful attention to the convictions of religious duty, so we believe that in all our efforts to advance *this* cause, as well as in

every other religious concern, we should seek to Him, for the guidance of his Holy Spirit, who has declared, "Without me ye can do nothing." Thus should we become qualified, not only to see with clearness, what is called for at our hands, but the concern itself being preserved on its original ground, we should be enabled to labour for its advancement, under the influence of Gospel love, and with feelings of good will to every class of our fellow men. And we would, in tenderness of feeling add, that should any of our members be led, from whatever motive, to abandon *this* ground, we fear that not only an individual loss would be sustained, but that the cause itself would thereby suffer.

Let us then, dear Friends, continue to be united together, and act as one body, strengthening and encouraging one another, in our endeavors so to keep under the benign influence of the Spirit of the Gospel, in the discharge of this and every other Christian duty, that we may be enabled availingly to ask for right ability to perform every good work,—in humble reliance upon an over-ruling Providence,—remembering, that although Paul may plant, and Apollos water, it is God who giveth the increase.

And while thus engaged, renewedly to call the attention of our own members to this important Testimony, and to the principles on which we have ever considered it to rest,—we have believed,—that while Slavery continues to exist, to a fearful extent, in some portions of our beloved country, and while, in addition to its other enormous evils, the internal traffic in Slaves, continues to rend asunder the tenderest of human ties, it can never cease to commend itself, as a subject of serious thoughtfulness, to every benevolent Christian mind. And we would affectionately invite the professors of other religious denominations, to give to the subject that attentive consideration, which its great and increasing importance would seem to demand. We cherish no disposition to prescribe to them, in what way their particular efforts to remove this, and other evils that abound in our land, shall be directed; but we would, in Christian freedom, encourage them to embrace every right opening, for endeavoring, in the spirit of Gospel love, to persuade their brethren in religious profession, residing in the slave-holding States, seriously to examine this momentous question, in all its various bearings. As it relates to the well-being of themselves, their chil-

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dren, and their country, we are persuaded they would find, (we have no doubt they often do find,) abundant cause for serious meditation; but were they, in sincerity of heart, without regard to self-interest and the maxims of a cruel policy, to enter upon an enquiry into its consistency with the precepts and doctrines of Him, who in the greatness of his love for a fallen world, gave himself a ransom for all,—how could they turn away from the conviction,—that to do justly, to love mercy, and to walk humbly with our God,—to love our neighbor as ourselves,—to do unto others, as we would that they should do unto us,—are duties of universal obligation?—and that to claim property in their fellow-men; to hold them in unconditional bondage; reaping the fruit of their labour without any adequate return; and with-holding, in great measure at least, the means of moral and religious instruction from those who are equally with themselves, and with us, heirs of the promises of salvation by Christ,—is wholly at variance with that dispensation, which was ushered into the world with the joyous anthem, of "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace, good will towards men." And seeing these things in their true light, and remembering that He whom we profess to serve, and who has "made of one blood, all nations of men, for to dwell on all the face of the earth," is no respecter of persons; that he is a God of justice, as well as of mercy, and hath declared: "For the oppression of the poor, for the sighing of the needy, I will arise saith the Lord"—how could they refrain from turning to Him for strength, to pursue the path of duty, that would thus be opened before them; and from becoming, at least, preachers of righteousness by their example, if the influence of example were all that they had it in their power to exert? And to this, we have ardently desired, they may be persuaded, in love unfeigned, and by every motive that can rightly influence the Christian mind—that the blessing of millions who are ready to perish, may come upon them.

We cannot doubt that there are, among the inhabitants of the States in which Slavery is now widely extended, those who are taking a thoughtful, sober view, of this highly interesting subject. We are fully aware that they are surrounded with difficulties of no ordinary magnitude. We sympathize with them in their peculiar trials. But we would,—that they could be encouraged, instead of

looking too much at the difficulties that are presented to their minds, to turn to the gracious offers of assistance to all who rightly ask it, which abound throughout the sacred volume,—and to the animating hope that is set before all those who, in sincerity and singleness of heart, obey the Gospel.

In conclusion, we cannot forbear repeating, the very great solicitude we have felt, that the members of every professing Christian church may, under a deep sense of religious duty,—and encouraged by the cheering declaration,—"Blessed are the merciful, for they shall obtain mercy"—commence, in earnest, the endeavour to clear their hands from all participation in the continuance of Slavery in our land; and then, we believe, that difficulties that may now seem to be insurmountable, would be made to disappear, and the system itself, through the Divine blessing upon their example and their labours, cease to be a reproach to us, as a Nation.

DEAR FRIENDS, In coming together as a Christian church, to watch over and regulate the affairs of our religious society, and to promote, as ability may be afforded, the cause of truth and righteousness, we have again been made sensible, in the midst of many conflicts and discouragements, of the condescending goodness of our Holy Head, Christ Jesus the Lord;—our strength has been renewed, and we have been refreshed together; our fellowship in Christ has been confirmed; and, in that love which has brought us near one to the other, we salute you in Christian sympathy and affection, and would bid our brethren everywhere to take comfort in Christ, to put on strength in his name, and to seek to be clothed with the whole armour of God.\*

fire; but there is support for them in the persuasion, that under no circumstances is the church more the object of the care and love of her Saviour than in her times of deepest tribulation: it is then that she is best prepared to take her part in those precious promises which are her sure inheritance in every age,—“I will never leave thee, nor forsake thee;” \* “When thou passest through the waters, I will be with thee; and through the rivers, they shall not overflow thee: when thou walkest through the fire, thou shalt not be burned; neither shall the flame kindle upon thee.” † We acknowledge, that as a church we have fallen very short of our high calling in Jesus Christ. The world, and the things of the world, have but too generally spread their deadening influence over us, and the warning voice needs to be sounded amongst us, “Be watchful, and strengthen the things which remain, that are ready to die.” ‡ The Lord is laying his hand upon us. He knoweth when the fruit-bearing branches need purging. Let it be an encouragement to us in every day of proving, under whatever circumstances it may be brought upon us, that His wise and blessed purpose is, that all our humiliations should work towards our more abundant fruitfulness; even that the fruit-bearing branches should bring forth more fruit.

The servants of Christ have ever been distinguished from the world, by the holiness, the self-denial, the unfeigned humility, and the godly circumspection of their every-day walk in life. A broad and well defined line of demarcation is drawn by the doctrine and precepts of the New Testament between the true Christian and the man of

the world. Not only must the believer be no longer conformed to this world, but he must be transformed by the renewing of his mind. This, dear friends, we need not say, is no transient or superficial work; it lies deep in the heart; it is in our fallen and corrupt nature that the pride of life and the lusts of the flesh find their proper soil; and it is to the heart that God applies the remedy which, in his abundant grace, he has provided for us in the gospel of his Son, that we, through repentance towards Him and living faith in Christ, may be converted from the error of our ways and from the love of the world, and be enabled to walk in his commandments. We desire for our dear friends, and for ourselves individually, that we may all come unflinchingly and unreservedly to the great question, Are we of Christ, or are we of the world? If we know Christ to have died for us, and really to rule in us by his Spirit, we shall no more live unto ourselves; but through the help of the Lord, we shall, day by day, live unto him who died for us and rose again. The true follower of Christ sets no limits to his allegiance to his Lord: quickened by his Spirit, animated by his love, and trusting with simple faith in his power, the language of his heart is, Draw me and I will run after thee.\* Thus it was with the early Christians; and these we believe were the principles which actuated our predecessors in their simple and devoted allegiance to Christ. It was in love to their Redeemer, and through the fear of God resting upon their minds, that they renounced the world; they entered into no compromise with its spirit, and thus they were enabled to see and uphold the standard of true Christian

simplicity. Our ancient testimony to "plainness of  
speech, behaviour, and apparel," springs from this root;  
and we are engaged to express our earnest desire, not only  
that it may be steadily maintained amongst us, but that  
the principle of true Christian plainness may be carried  
out, far more than it is, into all our domestic habits, our  
concerns in trade, and our general intercourse with men.

It would be strange if, in the conflicts to which our  
society has of late been exposed, many of its members had  
not been led into a close inspection of that which con-  
stitutes the bond of its Christian union; and in reverence  
and the fear of the Lord we acknowledge that the result  
of this scrutiny has, to a large extent, deepened our attach-  
ment to those doctrines and practices which, from the days  
of our forefathers, have distinguished us from others of  
the Christian name. The doctrine of the indwelling of  
the Holy Spirit and its perceptible guidance, as ever held  
by our society, is no dream of mystical philosophy; we  
regard it as one great feature of the new covenant, and its  
object is that knowledge of God and that living energy,  
which He alone can give, by which the lusts of the flesh  
are resisted, and the Christian soldier is directed and  
strengthened. Our views of the free and immediate opera-  
tion of the Holy Spirit—of the presidency of Christ in  
the church—of that which constitutes the call and quali-  
fication of all true gospel ministry—of the worship of  
God in Spirit and in truth—of the baptism which now  
saveth, by which the true believers are baptized into  
one body—of that which constitutes the true supper of  
the Lord, in which those who belong to Him, by faith in

his mediation and atonement, do feed upon his body and  
blood, and know it to be meat indeed, and drink indeed—  
remain unchanged. And we are again concerned to de-  
clare our conviction, "that all the ceremonies of the Jewish  
law were fulfilled and finished by the death of Christ; and  
that no shadows in the worship of God were instituted by  
our Lord, or have any place in the Christian dispensa-  
tion."\*

At this Meeting, as at former ones, we have received

We do not forget the temptations of our early life, and especially those incident to our entrance upon general intercourse with the world; they were slippery paths to us, and with humble thanksgivings to God we call to mind the tender care of his fatherly providence, the pleadings of his warning voice, how He strove with us, and his forbearance towards us. We know, that up to this hour, we have nothing to depend upon but the free mercy of God, in Jesus Christ our Lord; but, through the abounding of His grace renewed unto us, we cannot but express our strong solicitude—our prayer, that it may please the Lord to deal graciously with you, dear young friends; that He may never take his Holy Spirit from you, but deepen and strengthen your convictions of the guilt of sin, its hatefulness in his holy sight, and its certain and awful consequences to the impenitent and unconverted. O! that we could induce you duly to appreciate these tokens of our Heavenly Father's love, and that nothing might ever tempt you to call in question the divine origin of those secret checks in the conscience, those admonitions and faithful warnings, those pleadings of the Holy Spirit with the mind of man, by which our Heavenly Father would draw us to himself, and make us rich partakers of that pardon and reconciliation which He grants to his believing and contrite children through the blessed intercessions of our Saviour. ### EXTRACTS

#### FROM THE MINUTES OF THE YEARLY MEETING OF FRIENDS FOR NEW-ENGLAND,

HELD ON RHODE-ISLAND,

From the 10th to the 15th, inclusive, of the Sixth Month, 1838.

The following Report of the Boarding School Committee was received and read, and a Committee appointed to consider the several propositions therein contained.

#### TO THE YEARLY MEETING.

The Boarding School Committee report, That they have continued, during the past year, to give their attention to the various concerns of the Institution. Meetings for Divine worship have been regularly held, and harmony has prevailed. During the past autumn the School was visited, in common with the neighborhood, with Scarlet Fever, which attacked a large number of the inmates of the Institution, and proved fatal in two instances. In consequence of this solemn dispensation, many of the scholars returned to their homes, and did not subsequently re-enter the School; though for the past few months the family and scholars have been favored with the enjoyment of usual good health. The average number of scholars during the past year has been seventy-nine.

Our friends Rowland and Alice Rathbun are employed as Superintendents; and Samuel Austin and James Chase as Teachers in the Boys' School; and Emeline Aldrich and Elizabeth H. Osborne in the Girls'. George F. Read has charge of instruction in the Languages, and assists in keeping the Books; and Freelove Greene continues to act as a care-taker of the Girls, and to attend to the Sewing School. Moses B. Lockwood, who has recently left the Institution, has been employed as principal Teacher in the Boys' School during most of the past year.

The Committee have from time to time had under their consideration the propriety of dividing the year into two terms, with a vacation at the close of each term, instead of continuing under our present arrangement. Many advantages, it has appeared to them, would result from adopting this plan. It has, for several years, been a desirable object to enable the Teachers to introduce a better classification of the scholars in their various studies, than has been practicable under the existing system of admission at irregular intervals, and which they have believed would much facilitate their improvement. It has appeared to the Committee reasonable, that the health of the Teachers should be consulted, by affording them such relaxation from their employment as would result from the adoption of this arrangement. The consideration that the health of all the inmates of the Institution may be promoted by a more thorough cleansing of the house, twice in each year, than can be effected while its various apartments continue to be occupied, has also had much weight with them.

They are therefore united in proposing to the Yearly Meeting, that the year be divided into two terms of twenty-four weeks each, each term to be succeeded by a vacation of two weeks; the Summer term to commence on the second day preceding the first fifth day in the fifth month, and the Winter term on the second day preceding the first fifth day in the eleventh month; and that the last week of each term be occupied in an examination of the Schools, by Committees from time to time especially appointed to that service by the general School Committee.

Should this arrangement be approved by the Yearly Meeting, it will be expected that children shall enter the School at the commencement of each term; and consequently that the time of their continuance there, shall not, except under peculiar circumstances, and the approbation of the Acting Committee being first had, include a part of a term.

While this arrangement would, in the view of the Committee, be of essential advantage to the School, they are induced to believe that, when once carried into operation, it would not materially affect the convenience of parents. By far the greater number of children from the more distant parts of the Yearly Meeting now enter the School for a term of six months; and very few from any quarter remain there for a longer time, without making a visit to their friends. In cases, however, where great inconvenience is likely to arise to parents or children from the adoption of this plan, should any such present, the Committee will endeavor to make arrangements for their accommodation.

The Treasurer's and Superintendent's accounts have been settled, by which it appears that the income of the School has exceeded its expenditures by \$1345 28 cts., and that the present indebtedness of the Institution is \$3813 37 cts. For more particular information of the expenditures we refer to a copy of the Superintendent's account herewith

presented. The pecuniary situation of the School will not, we think, warrant any reduction in the terms of admission from those concluded on last year; and we therefore propose that the price for members of Society, of our Yearly Meeting, be *thirty-three* dollars per term—for those who are not members of Society, who may be admitted, one or both of whose parents are members, *forty-five* dollars per term; and for members of other Yearly Meetings, *fifty* dollars per term, payable in advance. Books and stationery being furnished, as during the past year, at actual cost; with the understanding, that when scholars leave the School, the Books with which they have been supplied may be returned, by their paying for the use of them.

Seven scholars have received the benefit of the charitable fund, and by the terms of the Will of the principal donor, claims to the amount of \$131 04 cts. have been provided for, leaving a balance unexpended of about \$60—and supposing the income of this fund to continue the same, the ensuing year, the amount will be about \$160, which will support fourteen scholars one term each; and it is proposed that such Monthly Meetings as have children who are proper objects of this charity should make immediate application to the Acting School Committee for their admission.

We have continued to appoint Committees to visit the Schools, and attend to the examination of the Scholars in their various studies, once in six months. From the Report of the Committee who visited the School in the third month last, made to us at this time, we think it may be satisfactory for us to make the following extract:—'The Committee to visit and examine the Schools report, that a number of them met at the time appointed, and proceeded to examine the Scholars in most or all the branches in which their attention had been engaged; and we feel free to acknowledge that we have cause to be thankful for the proficiency manifested by them in their various exercises, it being evident that they, as well as their Teachers, have been mindful of their duty, and that their attention had not been exclusively confined to improvement in literary and scientific studies, but that the more important pursuit of life, the attainment of piety and virtue, had not been overlooked. The deportment and general appearance of the Scholars were much to our satisfaction, and the harmony that manifestly prevails throughout the family is an evidence that the Institution is still under the care of Him who is able to preserve.'

At a subsequent sitting, the Committee appointed to take into consideration the several propositions contained in the preceding Report of the Boarding School Committee, produced the following Report, viz:

'To the Yearly Meeting.—The Committee to whom was referred the propositions contained in the Report of the School Committee, have had the same under consideration, and have concluded to recommend, that the Yearly Meeting adopt that in relation to dividing the year into two terms of twenty-four weeks each, with vacations of two weeks each between them, and recommend that Friends conform themselves thereto in sending their children to the School. It is, however, considered by this Committee to be desirable that a liberal construction should be given to the rule providing for admission for not less than six months, in favor of such as may wish to go for a shorter term, to complete the time they propose to spend at the School.

'And after some discussion, it was agreed to recommend that the terms of board, tuition, &c. proposed by the School Committee, be adopted.

During the time that has been occupied in considering the state of Society, as brought into view by the answers to the Queries, a covering has been spread over the Meeting, under the influence of which we have been made in degree to rejoice, in the feeling, that notwithstanding our many backslidings,—that stripped and peeled as we are,—we are not yet forsaken by the Great Head of the Church; but that in condescending goodness, He is still disposed to be with us and to do us good; and that 'in returning and rest,' we may still be permitted to have hope in His continued mercies.

Much of pertinent counsel and caution was feelingly imparted, by concerned Friends now with us; and we were affectionately exhorted, in the love of the Gospel, to 'be watchful and strengthen the things that remain, that are ready to die.' That the Church endeavoring, through holy help, to edify itself together in love, may enter into a deep travail of spirit for a qualification to labor for the removal of every hurtful thing from within its borders; and especially, for the restoration of love and unity in cases of sorrowful departure from this sure badge of discipleship, that have been deeply painful to many minds; and that the members of the church individually, may be concerned, in preference to every other pursuit, to 'seek first the kingdom of God, and his righteousness.' Then, we were feelingly reminded, should we cease to forsake the assembling of ourselves together, for the solemn object, the reasonable duty, of worshipping our Father who is in Heaven; and that being cemented together in the bonds of brotherly love, we should be enabled unitedly to worship Him in Spirit and in Truth.

Parents were tenderly exhorted to watch, with affectionate solicitude, over the minds of their children, and to seek in seasons of religious retirement with them, for ability rightly to discharge the very important duty of teaching them diligently, in the way that they should go; and the dear children were persuasively entreated, not to give way to any feeling that would lead them to withdraw themselves from under parental control, and to pursue a course of action independent of the counsel and advice of those who are thus watching over them for their good; but to bear in continued remembrance, the impressive injunction: 'Children, obey your parents in the Lord, for this is right,—Honor thy father and thy mother, which is the first commandment with promise.' And that all, of every age, may endeavor practically to bear in mind, that to the same extent that we are living members of the true church, we are members also one of another, and shall be led to consult its peace, by being kindly affectioned one toward another, and preferring one another in love.

A frequent perusal of the Holy Scriptures, with minds rightly turned to Him, under the influence of whose Spirit they were given forth—The restraints of Divine grace, operating upon the mind, in ordering our conduct and conversation among men;—an attention to its influence in restraining the perusal of improper books;—a careful regulation of our outward concerns by 'the limitations of Truth'—and a faithful maintenance, on christian grounds, of the simplicity of our profession in behavior, speech, and apparel—were subjects, among others, that were also feelingly touched upon.

And our dear absent Brethren being brought into affectionate remembrance, with desires that they may be enabled to participate, in some degree, in the exercises that have engaged the attention of Friends, the Clerk was directed to forward copies of this Minute, with the other extracts, to our Quarterly and Monthly Meetings.

and the privilege of true prayer, they found that stated  
forms were not adapted to their condition; they felt  
that the use of them was not in the life and power of  
the gospel, and therefore that it did not accord with  
that worship which is to be performed in truth.

Our sense of the spiritual character of the reign of  
Christ, and of the inadequacy of these forms to satisfy  
the soul, remains the same; and we continue to feel  
ourselves conscientiously restrained from uniting in any  
of those modes of worship which others think it right to  
adopt. Whilst we desire to cherish, and to inculcate  
true Christian charity towards those from whom we  
differ, we would affectionately encourage all our mem-  
bers to confine themselves, in the public performance of  
this solemn duty, to a diligent attendance of our own  
meetings for worship. Under the renewed conviction  
of the soundness and importance of this testimony to  
spiritual worship, we are quickened in desire that  
Friends may be kept alive to a right exercise of mind  
in our public assemblies. In the experience of past  
and present times it has been felt, and we believe by  
the waiting soul it will continue to be felt in our meet-  
ings for Divine worship, whether in the times of silence,  
or under the exercise of ministry, or the vocal offering  
of prayer, thanksgiving, and praise, that the words of  
the apostle are applicable: we are of those who "wor-  
ship God in the spirit, and rejoice in Christ Jesus, and  
have no confidence in the flesh." He grants to his

YEARLY MEETING OF FRIENDS FOR NEW-ENGLAND,

HELD ON RHODE-ISLAND,

From the 16th to the 21st, inclusive, of the Sixth Month, 1839.

The Annual Report of the Boarding School Committee was received and read, and being satisfactory to the  
Meeting, the Clerk was directed to forward copies thereof to our several Quarterly and Monthly Meetings, with  
the Circular of the Committee, issued in 1835, thereto appended. From the Minutes of said Meeting,  
A. SHEARMAN, jnr. Clerk.

In again presenting their Annual Report to the Yearly Meeting the School Com-  
mittee feel it right, notwithstanding some discouragements, gratefully to commemorate  
the mercy that has been extended to us, through which the various inmates of the Insti-  
tution have been preserved in good health, and the School, we have cause to believe, has  
continued to be useful to those who have been placed in it.

Meetings for Divine worship have been regularly held in the house, except during the  
time of the vacations, and harmony we believe prevails. The average number of scholars  
during the past year has been seventy-seven.

The late Superintendents of the School having resigned their trust, we have engaged  
our friends Allen and Olive Wing to act in that capacity, who have entered upon the  
discharge of their duties; and Jonathan I. Slocum, Samuel Austin and George F. Read,  
are employed as Teachers in the Boys' School, and Emmeline Aldrich and Elizabeth H.  
Osborne in the Girls'.

The Treasurer's and Superintendent's accounts have been settled, by which it appears  
that the debts of the Institution have been reduced during the past year, and that its  
present indebtedness is about two thousand dollars. For more particular information of  
the receipts and expenditures we refer to a copy of the Superintendent's account, here-  
with presented. In the present condition of the finances of the School, we have not  
thought it proper to propose any change in the terms from the prices of last year—which  
are \$33 per term, for members of this Yearly Meeting; \$45 for those scholars who are  
not members, where one or both parents are members, and \$50 for the members of other  
Yearly Meetings, payable in advance. Ten Dollars per term, additional charge, is made  
for instruction in the Languages. We have concluded to propose that stationary and  
books be furnished the children, for their use in the School, free of expense, except such  
as are necessary in the study of the higher branches, including the Mathematics and the  
Languages, and that these be supplied at their actual wholesale cost.

The income of the charitable fund will about support ten scholars, one term each, and  
Monthly Meetings that may desire to occupy the privilege are requested to make applica-  
tion to the Acting School Committee in season for their admission at the commencement  
of the winter term, which this year will be on the fourth day of the eleventh month.

The division of the year into two terms with vacations has, we think, proved salutary  
in practice, and the examination at the close of each term has been interesting and use-  
ful; but in order that it may not be interrupted during its progress, we desire that no  
child may be withdrawn from the School until it is completed, which it is intended shall  
take place on fifth day of the last week of the term; so that children will be ready to  
leave on sixth day morning of that week.

The observance of plainness of speech, behaviour and apparel, among the inmates of  
the Institution, has continued to claim our very serious attention, and we have laboured  
for the maintenance of the ancient testimonies of our Society in these respects. We have  
believed that usefulness might result from again forwarding the accompanying Circular,  
issued in 1835, to the several meetings of Friends; and the various Committees of the  
Monthly Meetings in recommending scholars to the School, as well as parents and  
guardians, are earnestly requested to exercise a care that the provisions therein con-  
tained are faithfully observed.

We also think it right to remind Friends of the established regulation of the School,  
that none are admitted into the male department, over fourteen years of age, who have  
not previously received permission from the Sub-Committee, which meets at the School  
House in Providence on third day preceding the first fifth day in every month.

At a meeting of the Committee of the New England Yearly Meeting Boarding School,  
held 8th mo. 7th, 1835—

The subject of an increased observance in this Institution of plainness of speech, behavior and apparel having, from time to time, claimed the serious attention of this Committee, and a lively concern on this account having been manifested at our last Yearly Meeting, we have believed it right for us at this time to revive the subject to our friends, and to point out, more explicitly than we have heretofore done, what we consider a proper dress for the children of this School.

While we feel that we are not called upon to enter extensively into a vindication of the propriety of maintaining our testimony in the particulars alluded to, we would affectionately remind our younger friends, that they are in accordance, as we believe, with the beautiful system of Christian simplicity taught by our blessed Lord and his apostles. And we may appeal to the experience of our Society to prove, that they have been as a hedge round about us, which it has ever been perilous to break down: and when, in individual instances, this has been done, that weakness and loss have been the consequence.

We should ever remember the apostolic exhortation, "Let your moderation be known unto all men." And "let not your adorning be that outward adorning of plaiting the hair, and of wearing of gold and of putting on of apparel, but let it be the hidden man of the heart, in that which is not corruptible, even the ornament of a meek and quiet spirit, which is, in the sight of God, of great price."

Were our minds, dear friends, duly impressed with a sense of the matchless love of our adorable Redeemer and Preserver—were our hopes and dependence placed on Him—how should we be raised above the undue attachment to the things of time and sense and a conformity to the vain fashions and customs of the world. And in accordance with the recommendations of our Discipline, we earnestly desire that parents and guardians would impress upon the minds of their children, the necessity of maintaining plainness of speech and behaviour, which is strictly required in the School; and it will be expected of every male admitted into this Institution, that his body-coat, jacket and vest, be single-breasted, and without lappels or falling collars, and where any of these are figured, that they be of patterns consistent with the plainness required in other parts of the dress—and that they wear hats, caps being excluded.

In the dress of females, we expect a correspondent degree of plainness, and that they avoid the extravagance of the fashions of the present day. They will be required to wear silk, or plain straw bonnets, without any trimmings for ornament. Their frocks or gowns should be of materials that are plain in color, and conformable in the size of the sleeves, and in other respects to convenience and propriety, and not according to the vain fashions of the world. Their handkerchiefs and collars should be without edgings or trimmings—and no article intended for ornament merely, will be permitted to be worn.

In order to carry into effect these regulations, the Superintendents are to examine the trunks and packages of the children previous to admission, and if any articles are found unsuitable on account of plainness, or for any other cause, they will be laid aside, or altered, and the expense charged to the parents or guardians.

No scholar will be admitted into the School after the present quarter, or permitted to remain here, who does not comply strictly with these regulations. And Committees of Monthly Meetings are desired to be careful not to give certificates to any children who will not conform thereto.

## EPISTLE

### FROM THE YEARLY MEETING OF FRIENDS FOR NEW-ENGLAND, TO ITS SUBORDINATE MEETINGS.

BEING again permitted to meet in our annual Assembly, our dear absent Friends have been affectionately brought to our remembrance, and we have been desirous that they might be partakers to some extent with us, in the exercises and interesting concerns that have claimed our attention.

Our meeting has been large and solemn; and we have had cause reverently to acknowledge that the wing of ancient Goodness has been in measure mercifully over us, and under its covering we have been favoured to conduct the concerns of the Church, that have come before us, in much brotherly love—to the Lord be the praise. We have had the acceptable company of several dear Friends from other Yearly Meetings, who have laboured to our comfort and edification.

By the Answers to the Queries, it appears that there are many deficiencies within our borders, and we have been brought earnestly to desire that there may be an increased concern among our members individually, faithfully to labour for their removal. A neglect of attending meetings for divine worship, particularly in the middle of the week, and a want of love and unity are among the painful deficiencies that are brought into view. Love to God and love to man—on these two commandments hang all the Law and the Prophets. When we remember our dependence upon Almighty God; when we reflect that every blessing that we enjoy both temporal and spiritual proceedeth from Him; that all things were formed and are still sustained by the word of His Power; that it is of His mercy that we are not consumed; how can we neglect the reasonable service of assembling ourselves together to worship Him? And how, beloved Friends, can we put up our petition to Him, that He will be pleased to forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us, while we continue to harbour in our hearts unkind feelings towards a brother? If we are wanting in these two most essential qualifications of the christian—love to God and love to man,—it is in vain for us to attempt to support availingly, any of our religious principles and testimonies; and we have been renewedly made sensible that a deficiency herein has led to the other departures that have been brought to our notice. Let us, dear Friends, scrupulously examine ourselves and know the condition of our hearts in this respect.

Among the failures in duly maintaining our religious testimonies we notice with sorrow, some of a military nature. The faithful support of our religious views of the peaceable nature of the Gospel of Christ has been felt by us at this time to be of great weight. We believe that our predecessors in religious faith had their minds divinely illuminated to understand the teachings of Christ and his Apostles on this subject, and that it is our duty to endeavour to come up faithfully in their footsteps. There are, as we apprehend, errors on either hand on this important doctrine; but we earnestly crave for our members that they may be preserved on the ancient, christian ground of our religious Society; believing that they will find this to be practical and safe ground for them to stand upon.

It is a day, beloved Friends, when the eyes of the people are much turned towards us; and we have ardently coveted that our Light might so shine before men that they seeing our good works may glorify our Father who is in Heaven.

The doctrine of the necessity-of the immediate, qualifying power of the Holy Spirit in order for the discharge of religious duty, has ever been a fundamental principle of our Society, and must continue to be acknowledged by all faithful Friends as being necessary for us practically to receive. Our testimonies against War, Oaths, Slavery, &c. are religious testimonies; and we believe we can only successfully plead them before the world, or effectively enforce them upon others, as we receive this Heavenly qualification from the Great Head of the Church.

This Meeting has been introduced into much concern that our members may be preserved from attempting in their own time and strength to do the work of the Lord. Remember the declaration of the dear Redeemer—"My time is not yet come; but your time

is always ready." And we have been led to fear that in associating with others who do not acknowledge, as we do, the need of this immediate, divine qualification in order for the performance of religious duties, we are in great danger of neglecting this fundamental principle, and of attempting to act with them in our own strength and zeal; and thus lose that ability to labour successfully in the Lord's cause which He is pleased graciously to vouchsafe to those whom He calls into His service. And under this feeling of concern we believe it right for us tenderly to persuade our dear Friends to avoid mingling with the various associations of the day for the support of those Christian testimonies which our Society has peculiarly felt itself called upon to bear before the world; but keeping together as a religious body, in love—looking unto the great Helper of His people for Holy assistance, we may yet trust, in the Lord's own good time, to be in some measure the humble instruments in His hand of doing His heavenly will.

Oh! dear Friends, let us be engaged to watch unto prayer; let us gather home in the spirits of our minds unto the Great Shepherd and Bishop of souls, and reverently wait upon Him; that thus we may be preserved from the spirit, the maxims and the policy of the world that leads unto death. May we be favoured to abide in Christ—"As the branch cannot bear fruit of itself except it abide in the vine; no more can ye except ye abide in me." And now, beloved Friends, farewell. We desire that in simple faith we may commit ourselves into the preserving hand of Him "who is able to keep us from falling and to present us faultless before the presence of His glory with exceeding joy—to whom be glory and majesty, dominion and power forever."
